The purpose of professional development (PD) is to enhance skills and knowledge to support student achievement and program success. Professional development can encompass learning relevant information to meet grant requirements to developing sustained classroom practice to standards implementation. What Has Seven Heads, 14 Hands and 70 Fingers?

The Trainers of the Resource Centers: Joyce Winters, Christina Theuerling, Dianna Baycich, Judy Franks, Jenny Davis, Kathy Knall and MB Totten. That is, combined we have that many heads, hands and fingers. Over the last several months we have kept those appendages busy by updating the online portion of the New Teacher Orientation workshop.

Our first step was to update the name of the workshop series to New Staff Orientation (NSO), thereby including all directors, instructors, aides and support staff in our plans as we re-designed the online portion of this two-part training.

The second step was to create this online workshop in Moodle. Similar to Blackboard, Moodle is an online Course Management System. By using Moodle we will present not only coursework, but discussion lists and resources for everyone to use, at anytime. New Staff Orientation Part I is no longer just an online introduction to ABLE, it is a resource of basic ABLE information for the State of Ohio.

New Staff Orientation has been divided into six modules:

- Who We Are: The ABLE System
- Who We Serve: ABLE Students
- How We Serve: Student Experience Model (SEM)
- How We Know: Accountability
- How We Work: ABLE Programs Operations
- How We Grow: Professional Development

Directors will notice these modules are exactly the same headings outlined on the New Staff Orientation Checklist distributed last year to ABLE programs.

One highlight of this online training is that participants may review any topic, in any order, at any time, giving the learner freedom to read relevant information right away and peruse other topics at their leisure.

Finally, the last step is to present this online course to a pilot group. To that end, we have determined that the training will be made available to all new instructors from September 1st through November 30th. They will work through the six modules and complete the investigative activities. We will ask them to complete an evaluation of the course so that continued improvements may be made.

The most important aspect of the NSO facelift is that the two-part training may be done in any order – that is, new teachers no longer must complete the online Part I before attending the face-to-face Part II. The only stipulation is that both parts must be completed within the first year of hire.

Registration for the trainings (Part I and Part II) are done as before – via the RCN Calendar (http:// mercury.educ.kent.edu/database/rcn/calendar_results. cfm). NSO Part I will be listed under Alternative Delivery and NSO Part II will be listed on the regular calendar as scheduled by your Resource Center.

After the evaluation period, although the current curriculum is focused primarily on New Teachers,



anyone in any ABE/GED program is welcome to view the online tutorial as all information presented is relevant in some way to those working in ABLE in Ohio. An announcement with further directions will be made in Friday Facts. In the meantime, feel free to contact your local Resource Center if you have any questions regarding this training.

The Perfect Pair- Reading and Writing

Reading and writing go hand in hand and at the Southwest Resource Center (SWRC). They are our focus areas. While there is enough information about how to teach reading and writing to children to fill a football stadium, the SWRC is focused on what works for adults. Our students need instruction that effectively and efficiently helps them build skills to meet their academic, employment and personal goals. Our professional development offerings, our lending library resources and other "tools of the trade" represent the current evidence base for adults. These are all available to you.

In addition, we've been participating in a national reading reform initiative that provides us with "hot off the press" ideas and practice for adult readers. STAR (Student Achievement in Reading) is targeted specifically to those at-risk readers who are reading between 4th and 8th grade levels. You know these students: they struggle with PreGED and GED materials; they plateau; they leave. Reading to learn is not possible when you still need to learn to read.

Below is a sampling of what you can get from the SWRC:

- Online introductions to evidence-based reading and writing instructional principles.
- Videos/DVDs that demonstrate how to teach reading and writing.
- Classroom materials including sets of fiction and information texts at a variety of reading levels.
- Writing Helps that go from basic writing to college-ready.

- Access to a "person" to talk with you about your student's individual needs and your professional development interests.
- Informal reading/writing assessment tools to dig a little deeper for student skills.
- Professional Journals from national organizations: *The Reading Teacher, The English Journal, Adult Basic Education and Literacy Journal and Educational Leadership.*

Our Resource Center is housed on the main campus of Sinclair Community College in downtown Dayton. From there we serve 14 ABLE programs stretching across 15 counties of southwest Ohio. 



Math Resources and PD

One of the specialty areas of the OLRC is Mathematics. We offer a number of different opportunities for ABLE teachers to develop their skills in math and the teaching of math.

Fall 2009 will mark the 16th year for conducting the Annual Math Kick-Offs, four regional daylong workshops focused on a targeted topic area or instructional methods. With post-secondary transition being of interest to many ABLE students, this year's topic will be on higher level math – register on the RCN Calendar for your region's Kick-Off.

A daylong, intensive Statewide Math Workshop is also held every spring and focuses on a specific topic of current interest and/or importance to ABLE programs. Additional math sessions are offered periodically throughout the year at RCN PD days and through Regional Resource Centers.


In between state and regional training dates, the OLRC also offers another option for Math professional development – on-site training in local programs! The director of any ABLE-funded program may request a math trainer to provide professional development at his or her local program at no cost to the program or participants. Four topic areas are offered:

• Algebra content: This interactive workshop will NOT focus on teaching techniques, but on the content needed to be successful for the GED test as well as the basic stackable certificate. Topics will include the coordinate grid, tables, graphs, equations, expressions, substitution, slope-intercept equation of a line, slope, distances, the distributive property, operations with integers, absolute values, powers and roots, scientific notation, solving one and two-step equations, etc. Time suggested: 3 hours.

- **Geometry content:** This interactive workshop will NOT focus on teaching techniques, but on the content needed to be successful for the GED test. Topics will include: vocabulary, points, lines, angles, measurement, triangles, quadrilaterals, circles, Pythagorean Theorem, perimeter, areas, volume, surface area, etc. Time suggested: 3 hours.
- **GED Math Test:** What is on the test? How can I help my students succeed? This interactive workshop will focus on the content of the GED math test, along with ideas for student success. Ideas for effective structure of a multi-level classroom will be explored. Time suggested: 2½-3 hours.
- **Problem-solving:** This interactive workshop will provide teachers with an opportunity to explore and learn problem solving methods that will help both students and teachers become better problem solvers. Time suggested: 3 hours.

The Eureka! resource database (http://literacy.kent.edu/eureka/) has a wide variety of resources available designed to assist teachers with developing contextual instruction in math. Lesson plans, teaching strategies, , and instructional planning resources are all available online at no cost to programs. The Eureka! Trade books search has a large number of books – all available at local libraries and through the OLRC – on math topic areas, including budgeting, estimation, measurement, logical reasoning, and more!

Transitions Respository

The ABLE Transitions Repository is an online database of resources which relate to students transitioning to either post-secondary or to the workplace. Most resources have a direct application to transitions classes and content, but some (particularly in the Academic Skills section) may have an indirect application for preparing lower-level students for transitions coursework and goal-setting.

Since February of this year, over 300 resources have been recommended for review in the Ohio ABLE Transitions Repository! Currently 98 resources have been approved for inclusion in the repository and 83 more are at various stages of the review process. Because the number of resources is steadily increasing, a search feature will be implemented this fall.

In order to be included in the review process, all suggested resources must meet first-cut criteria, including being applicable to student transition goals and must be easily available to practitioners either online, through the ABLE Resource Center Network, or through local libraries. Once the first-cut criteria are met, resources are reviewed by at least two reviewers and must meet minimum scores in order to be included in the repository. Reviewers are all ABLE practitioners and include teachers, administrators, and state leadership staff. Reviewers provide comments about the resources and may include instructional ideas, cautions, or general thoughts on the resource.

All resources are reviewed on the categories of: application to student transition goals; contextual content; and information presentation. Each resource is also rated on at least one of the following audience-specific categories: student engagement; instructional application; and enhancing the knowledge base of teachers and administrators.

Items in the Repository are classified into six defined categories: academic skills, career pathways, career/ workplace transitions, contextualized curriculum, post-secondary transition, and professional development. Additional information, such as availability, keywords, and general description are also included.

Samples of accepted resources by category are:

Academic Skills

• New Ways in Teaching Writing - offers a range of activities that develop different composing skills, attend to the social processes of reading and writing, involve the peer group in evaluating and responding to drafts, focus on different types and formats of writing, and stimulate these activities through diverse techniques and methods. This book is primarily designed for ESOL teachers.

Career Pathways

Tools for Success, Soft Skills for the Construc-



tion Industry - provides the fundamental tools necessary to ensure success in the construction industry. Being a skilled craftsperson is important, but in today's competitive workplace, the soft skills are equally important. This soft skills training workbook will provide a blueprint for a successful career in construction.

Career/Workplace Transitions

• Occupational Outlook Handbook - provides specific information on individual jobs, including what type of education is required, work activities, pay grades, and future outlook for the specific job. Website also includes information and tips on jobseeking and state-specific information.

Contextualized Curriculum

• Embedded Learning Curriculum module: Social care - This set of instructional resources is part of the United Kingdom's Embedded Learning Portal. The Social [Elder/Disabled] Care module is contextualized for healthcare employees who work with individuals who are elderly and/or disabled. The set includes five modules: communicating in care; information at work; communicating for care planning; figure it out (math at work); and worker development. All modules include skills checklists, lesson plans, activities, and related handouts. Modules are available in PDF and MS Word formats.

Post-secondary Transition

• Transitioning Adults to College: Adult Basic Education Program Models - this NCSALL occasional paper describes the five most common models of post-secondary transition programs identified by the New England Literacy Resource Center (NELRC) at World Education, Inc. The models are described in-depth and example programs are included, as well as the strengths and limitations of each model. State-level transitions programs are included with descriptions of four states' approaches. The authors also distill the benefits of post-secondary education for adult literacy learners as well as challenges and barriers that students may face.

Professional Development

• Adult Reading Toolkit, The - A Research-Based Resource for Adult Literacy - The ART covers all four components of the reading process identified by the Report of the National Reading Panel (2000): alphabetics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension. It includes six chapters and within each chapter is a case study or practitioner research summary, key vocabulary terms, research findings from K-12, adult literacy, and adult ELL, key ideas for instruction and assessment, instructional activities, instructional decisions, and suggestions for using authentic materials, published curriculum and software.
